



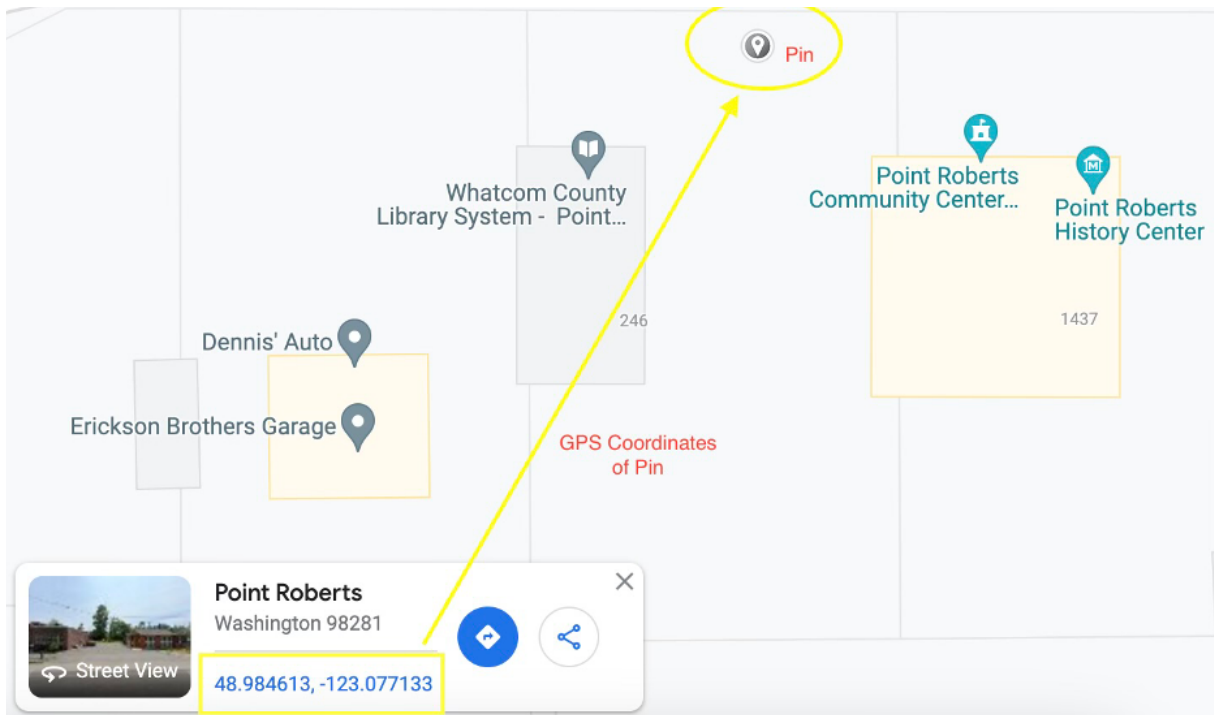
## How To Pin & Send a Tree Location via Google or Apple Maps

Thank you for helping to map English ivy burdened trees in Whatcom County! Your efforts will help our beautiful and essential trees to live much longer, enhancing our community's climate resiliency and quality of life!

When you see one or more trees with ivy climbing up the trunk, please tell us the **location** (GPS coordinates) and **quantity** of ivy-affected trees. That's all we need to know so we can add it to our database and be sure to save those trees soon. **One map pin per tree cluster is best – there's no need to send us info about each individual tree.**

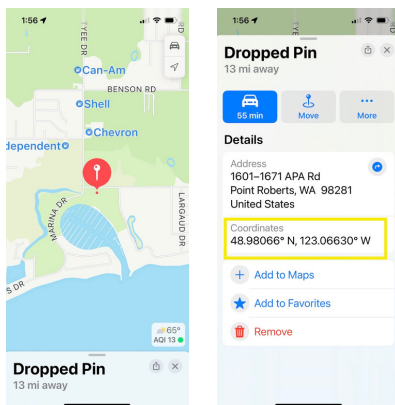
To learn how to get and send a place's GPS coordinates, see below.

### In Google Maps



1. Open Google Maps, then click or tap where the ivy-burdened trees are located.
  - a. **On a laptop or tablet**, the coordinates will then appear in a box, as shown above. Tap its **Share** icon.
  - b. **On a phone**, scroll below the **Directions** tab to see coordinates. Tap those coordinates.
2. Among the Share options that will appear, choose **email**.
3. Be sure to add a note stating the **quantity** of ivy-affected trees (and anything else you want to tell us about it), then send your email to [ivy@whatcommilliontrees.org](mailto:ivy@whatcommilliontrees.org)

## In Apple Maps



1. Open Apple Maps, then click or tap where the ivy-burdened trees are located.
2. Click the "Share" icon on the upper right side of the window.
3. Among the Share options that will appear, choose **email**.
4. Be sure to add a note stating the quantity of ivy-affected trees (and anything else you want to tell us about it), then send your email to [ivy@whatcommilliontrees.org](mailto:ivy@whatcommilliontrees.org)
